# HISTORY ON THE EDGE



Castle Hill overlooks Plaisance, the original French capital of Newfoundland, now known as Placentia. This 17th century French fortification predates the Fortress of Louisbourg in Nova Scotia and predicates the role Louisbourg would later play as the French gateway to Canada and naval base for the French fishery in North America. Here you will discover why the French and British battled for control of Newfoundland. With its wide rocky beach perfectly suited to drying cod, Placentia, or "Plaisance" as the French called it, appeared to be a good choice. During your visit, you will learn how colonial settlers lived here, and why they eventually left.

## While You're In the Area

HAWTHORNE COTTAGE Hawthorne Cottage is just over an hour away. It is the Brigus home of world renowned arctic explorer Captain Bob Bartlett. Built in 1830, the cottage contains displays and monuments of Bob Bartlett's many achievements and adventures.

SHIP HARBOUR About forty minutes from Castle Hill, in the community of Ship Harbour, is the Ship Harbour Monument. This site commemorates the drafting of the Atlantic Charter in 1941 by Sir Winston Churchill and Franklin D. Roosevelt on a battleship off Ship Harbour Point.

SALMONIER NATURE PARK This park is about one hour from Placentia, 53 km east on the Salmonier Line (Route 90). Here you can see moose, caribou, lynx, fox, bald eagles, and many other animals found in this part of Newfoundland.

CAPE ST. MARY'S ECOLOGICAL RESERVE Approximately 65 km south of Castle Hill is Cape St. Mary's. Here you will find the second largest colony of nesting gannets in North America as well as blacklegged kittiwakes, Atlantic murres, Northern razorbills, black guillemots, double-crested and great cormorants. Northern fulmar also nest among a magnificent sea stack that rises 100 metres out of the ocean, just ten metres off the mainland. A bird watcher's must-see, and a photographer's delight.

## **Explore Castle Hill**

The Placentia area attracted Basque fishermen as early as the 16th century. Large quantities of codfish, highly prized in Europe, brought fishermen in droves. The French government founded the colony in 1662.

During the late 17th and early 18th centuries, French and British forces fought sporadically for control of Newfoundland, though the island's fate was still heavily influenced by events in Europe.

Determined to ensure access to the Newfoundland fishery, the French chose Plaisance for its excellent harbour and proximity to the Grand Banks and as a check to English expansion. Here they hoped to build a colony that would solidify their claim to a portion of the fishing rights around the island of Newfoundland.

In late 1696 and early 1697, under the leadership of New France's most famous soldier, Pierre Le Moyne d'Iberville, the French marched overland from Plaisance to the Southern Shore, up towards St. John's and on into Conception Bay. D'Iberville was successful, easily taking all but one of his targets. His mer destroyed 36 settlements and captured more than 500 fishing boats, 200,000 quintals of cod and 700 prisoners in four months.

Back in France, a decision to send d'Iberville to Hudson Bay may well have saved the British from being driven out of Newfoundland.

Placentia proved to be a poor choice for the French colonists. Despite successful fortifications at Castle Hill which allowed the French to fend off British attacks, Plaisance had serious problems: the British were able to blockade Placentia Bay fairly easily; the French colonists had limited access to basic supplies; the land itself was not good for farming, and yielded little in the way of crops or livestock. With no supporting infrastructure and rivalries between residents and seasonal fishermen on the rise, the colony was destined to fail.

Today, the remains of France's 17th century fortifications at Castle Hill are all that exists of the French presence here. Events in Europe sealed Placentia's fate when Britain gained sovereignty over Newfoundland by the Treaty of Utrecht, leaving France with fishing rights along the northeast and west coasts of the island.

The French colonists and soldiers from Placentia moved on to build the Fortress of Louisbourg (now a National Historic Site) in Nova Scotia. Castle Hill was briefly occupied and fortified by the British during the Seven Years War, but Placentia was soon to be overshadowed by the island's burgeoning economic and political capital St. John's.


