Venture to the land of the midnight sun,

where rich culture and history intertwines with wide open spaces and opportunity for adventure! From rugged mountains, to charming northern towns, this 8-day itinerary is one to add to your bucket list.

DAY 1

S.S. KLONDIKE

Whitehorse

Explore the grounds of the S.S. *Klondike*, one of two remaining sternwheelers in the Yukon and the largest of its fleet. Join our knowledgeable guides and hear fascinating stories of life on the river, and what it takes to restore and maintain the dry docked vessels that shaped an entire era of transportation.

From there, stroll the banks of the Yukon River, stopping along the way to visit the McBride Museum and the Kwanlin Dün Cultural Centre. Spend time relaxing and watch the water sparkle in the northern sun.

DAY 2

DAWSON CITY

530 km from Whitehorse

Travel north to Dawson City and check out the magnificent Five Finger Rapids along the way. Once known as the "Paris of the North", Dawson City blends the legacy of the Klondike Gold Rush and the cultural traditions of the Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in. Join Parks Canada's array of programs for tales of this unique place, while exploring historic buildings and industrious vessels.







DAY 3

DAWSON HISTORICAL COMPLEX AND S.S. KENO

Visit the waterfront and board Tr'ehcho (S.S. Keno), a small but mighty vessel representative of two cultures who are intimately connected to the Yukon River. Step inside historical buildings and chat with costumed guides to hear the stories of the quirky characters who have walked the wooden boardwalks of this storied town. In the Commissioner's Residence, thought-provoking conversations about the impact of the Klondike Gold Rush on the Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in take place, offering the opportunity to learn about the full scope of our shared history. Opt to challenge yourself in one of two different escape rooms in some of Dawson's oldest buildings, or find yourself exploring the Dänojà Zho Cultural Centre and hear about Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in stories and traditions. Will you have time to experience it all?

DAY 4

DISCOVERY CLAIM AND DREDGE NO. 4 20 km from Dawson City

Explore the Klondike goldfields! Visit Gah dëk (Discovery Claim) and follow the trail to the spot where gold was found in 1896.

Lëzra kanëcha (Dredge No. 4) will tower up out of the valley; once inside you will be amazed at the story of how it plied the creeks for gold, forever altering the landscape. Don't forget to visit the abandoned company town site of Bear Creek, eerily frozen in time when the last dredge finally stopped running and the company closed its doors over 50 years ago.

DAY 5 KLUANE

Haines Junction, 660 km from Dawson City

Make your way to Haines Junction and stop in at the Da Kų Culture Centre to get up-to-date park information and explore the interpretive facility that honours the Champagne and Aishihik First Nations language, stories, connection to the land and living culture.

After a long day on the road, stretch your legs along the Dezadeash River Trail before resting for night. Adventures await tomorrow! There are many ways to experience the park. Book a flightseeing tour to get up close to Kluane's magnificent icefields and glaciers or get your hiking gear together and set off to discover the amazing landscapes Kluane has to offer by foot!

DAY 6

KLUANE

Thechal Dhal' Visitor Centre, 70 km from Haines Junction

Be sure not to miss out on a drive to the northern side of the park! Situated in the 'Ä'äy Chù Valley, this side of the park boasts incredible scenery and provides an opportunity to learn how climate change has altered the landscape of this region. Soak in the views of Kluane Lake from the Soldier's Summit Trail and check out fascinating exhibits at the Thechàl Dhâl' Visitor Centre. Out on the deck scan with a spotting scope, you might get lucky and catch a glimpse of some Dall sheep!







DAY 7

KLUANE

Mät'àtäna Män (Kathleen Lake), 30 km from Haines Junction

Get your hiking gear together and set off to discover the amazing landscapes Kluane has to offer by foot! Home to 17 of the country's 20 tallest mountains, including Canada's highest peak, 5,959-metre Mount Logan, Kluane also has the world's largest concentration of ice fields and glaciers. Get ready for an adventure and hike up the King's Throne trail or have a leisurely day enjoying the scenery along the lake. Opt to stay overnight in one of Parks Canada's signature oTENTiks and camp under the stars at Kathleen Lake campground.

DAY 8

KLUANE

Rock Glacier, 20 km from Mät'àtäna Män

Wake up and spend a morning soaking up the magnificent scenery at Mät'àtäna Män. There's still time to enjoy the views from the Rock Glacier Trail before heading back to Whitehorse.

THE CHALLENGE

How can we better protect the endangered Peary caribou?

Long before Qausuittuq National Park in Nunavut was established, oil and gas exploration during the 1970-80s left behind lots of industrial trash such as hundreds of fuel barrels, some empty and others full, and an estimated 244 m² of debris. More than just an eyesore, it is harmful to Peary caribou and their habitat.

A STEP IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION

Inuit partners and Parks Canada staff have come together to tidy the tundra to benefit caribou and support a healthy ecosystem.

THE RESULT

Partnerships and strong community support flourished as over 190 empty fuel barrels were removed. An abandoned surveyor camp was also discovered, requiring additional clean-up work!



DRAMATIC SILA FALLS

There are two sets of falls on this river accessible from Sila Lodge in **Ukkusiksalik** National Park in Nunavut. The first is about a half hour walk from the lodge. Walk further for a couple hours and see a more dramatic waterfall cutting through the bedrock.

SINGING WATER

My favourite stopover while paddling the Broken Skull River in Nááts'ihch'oh National Park Reserve in the Northwest Territories is scrambling up Tu ?ulah Shúh (Singing Water Mountain). The rocky climb is tough, but when you get to the top you have a mesmerizing view of the river valley. It's incredible to see all the way back to where you started your journey at Otaa Tu Fehto (Divide Lake).



WOOD BUFFALO NATIONAL PARK KLUANE NATIONAL PARK AND RESERVE

UNDER NORTHERN SKIES

Venture up north to watch the northern lights dance in the largest dark-sky preserve in the world. The best time to see the magic of the dark sky in Wood Buffalo National Park is late summer, fall and early spring.

Kluane's two-day Northern Nights festival held annually in September features a variety of fun activities, including star gazing with local astronomers, night sky photography workshops, traditional storytelling, live music and kids' activities.



MAKE IT HAPPEN!

HOW TO GET TO CANADA'S NORTH

BE PREPARED

- During summer in the High Arctic, the sun shines 24 hours a day and is very strong – bring sunscreen and a sleeping mask!
- Expect weather delays in any season; it can snow in any month!
- Get deals on airfare by contacting your travel agency and watch for periodic seat sales. For Nunavut, check with Travel Nunavut.
- Contact the park or historic site for detailed information before booking.

NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

- Tuktut Nogait, Aulavik and Ivvavik are accessible via chartered flights from Inuvik.*
 - * Fly to Inuvik via scheduled air service from Edmonton, Vancouver, Yellowknife or Whitehorse, or drive the Dempster Highway.
- For Pingo Canadian Landmark, drive up the Dempster highway, continue past Inuvik and drive along the Inuvik-Tuktoyaktuk Highway.
- Get to Wood Buffalo via a year-round paved highway to Fort Smith, NT, or winter roads to Fort Chipewyan, AB also provide seasonal access to the park. Access both communities via flights from Yellowknife, NT or Edmonton, AB.
- Access Nahanni by chartered flights from Fort Simpson or Yellowknife, NT, Muncho Lake in BC or Watson Lake in the Yukon. Get detailed information by visiting parks.canada.ca/nahanni.
- Nááts'ihch'oh is accessible through chartered flights from Tulita or Norman Wells, NT. Get detailed information by visiting parks.canada.ca/naatsihchoh.

 Thaidene Nene is less than 10 kilometres from Łutsël K'é, NT, which has daily scheduled flights from Yellowknife. Make your way from there via an experience with a licensed operator or by watercraft or snowmobile. Additionally, air charters are available from Yellowknife. More details are available at parks.canada.ca/thaidene-nene.

Q YUKON

- Kluane, Chilkoot Trail and S.S. Klondike historic sites can all be reached by road.
- Dawson City and Klondike National Historic Sites are accessible by car or by plane; flights depart from Whitehorse.
- **Vuntut** and **Ivvavik** can be reached by air charter from Inuvik, and Old Crow.

NUNAVUT

- **Quttinirpaaq** is accessible via scheduled flights to Resolute, then by air charter.
- **Sirmilik** is accessible via scheduled flights to Pond Inlet or Arctic Bay, then by licensed boat or snowmobile operator.

 Auyuittuq is accessible via scheduled flights to Qikiqtarjuaq and Pangnirtung, then by licensed boat or snowmobile operator.


MANITOBA

- For Prince of Wales Fort, Cape Merry Battery is accessible by road year-round, while Sloop Cove is accessible by boat in July and August.
- York Factory is accessible by helicopter as well as by boat in July and August.
- Wapusk is accessible by helicopter year-round and by snowmobile in the winter.

NEWFOUNDLAND AND LABRADOR



A protected area covering 10 700 km² of mountain tundra, marine coasts, boreal forests, islands and rivers of great cultural significance for the Innu, Inuit and others. Potential visitors should be aware there is minimal infrastructure and services, including search and rescue capabilities. In collaboration with Indigenous partners and others in the tourism sector, Parks Canada will work to create these experiences and services.
