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Mount Revelstoke and Glacier National Parks

Welcome to the Columbia Mountains

Mount Revelstoke and Glacier national parks represent the Columbia Mountains natural region of Canada. This is a rugged landscape with lush interior rainforests in the valleys, steep mountain sides of subalpine forest, and extensive treeless areas at the highest elevations.

The parks keep detailed records of plants and animals. The following lists summarize the known status of each species of vertebrate animal recorded within the parks or close to park boundaries. The bird list follows the standard common names established by the American Ornithologist's Union. Since there are no standard common names for other wildlife groups, scientific names are provided in parenthesis.

The parks would welcome receiving information on species not included on these lists or on other wildlife observations of interest (large numbers, unusual behaviour etc.). 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The **Rogers Pass Centre** contains a library of reference books open to public use and extensive reference collections plants and animals.

The symbols following each species indicate its season of occurrence and its relative abundance within the parks. Many of these species are more abundant in the Columbia River valley adjacent to the parks.

BIRDS

Although 183 species of birds have been observed within the parks, the most you can hope to see on a very good day in June is about 50 species. During winter, when most birds have left the mountains, you'd need luck to see 10 species in a day!

Good places to watch birds in Mount Revelstoke include Skunk Cabbage Trail, Inspiration Woods Trail, and the lower elevations of the Summit Trail. In July and August, the Mount Revelstoke Summit Parkway offers you easy access to the high country and the chance to see some local specialities such as Hawk Owl, Blue Grouse, and Boreal Chickadee. This is one of the few places in Canada where four species of chickadees live. You could try for a "grand slam" of chickadees by looking for Chestnut-backed and Black-capped chickadees at Giant Cedars Trail and for Boreal and Mountain chickadees at the summit of Mt. Revelstoke.

In Glacier, the Beaver River and Loop trails offer some of the best birdwatching. If you want to see a Dipper, look along the Connaught Creek behind the Glacier Park Lodge, along Asulkan Brook beside Asulkan Trail, or along the little creek opposite the parking lot at Illecillewaet Campground. Trails such as Avalanche Crest, Abbott Ridge, Perley Rock, and Hermit lead to the treeless alpine and are likely spots to see Golden Eagles, White-tailed Ptarmigan, Water Pipits, and Rosy Finches.

If you drive through the parks during the winter, watch for Pine Siskins, Red Crossbills, and White-winged Crossbills on the highway. Some years thousands invade the mountains and many are killed by traffic. If you see a flock on the road ahead, honk your horn and slow down. During winter, Pygmy Owls often perch on trees along the highway.

The Columbia River valley just west of Mount Revelstoke is another excellent place to watch birds. The species listed in parenthesis (58) have been recorded in this valley but not yet in the parks. The area around the Revelstoke Airport has developed a reputation as bird watching hotspot in the interior of British Columbia.

MAMMALS

Of the 54 species of mammals recorded in the parks, the two species of bears are the best known. Both Black and Grizzly bears are relatively common here. Late May is the best time to observe bears. Look for Grizzly Bears on avalanche paths above the highway in Glacier and Black Bears along the highway through both parks. All bears are potentially dangerous and should never be approached. Ask park staff for advice on safe travelling in bear country before you go hiking in the park.

Mountain Goats are the most common large mammal in the parks. If you stop at Tractor Sheds Picnic Area in Glacier and scan the cliffs above the snowsheds, you are almost sure to see one.

Although most mammals live in the parks the year-round, bats migrate

out of the area for the winter. No-one knows where they go. Many bats live along the trail at Giant Cedars Picnic Area and you can often see them at dusk dipping down to a woodland pool for a drink of water before an evening of catching insects.

No species of reptile is common in the park. The harsh mountain environment is probably too hostile for them. Although Painted Turtles have not been recorded within the parks, they are common along the Columbia River at Revelstoke.

AMPHIBIANS

The only common amphibian in the park is the Western Toad which has the remarkable ability to live from the valley bottoms to treeline.

FISH

Of the 6 species of fish living in park waters, all are native to this area except Brook Trout. Alpine lakes such as Eva, Miller, and the Jade lakes in Mount Revelstoke are naturally barren of fish. They were once stocked with trout to provide sport fishing. Generally, park waters are very poor in nutrients and fish grow and reproduce very slowly. By comparison, the Columbia River outside the parks has a very diverse fish fauna.
