#### **Poison Ivy**

Poison Ivy is a very common plant in the park and can be found growing as a climbing vine or as a ground-hugging shrub. This plant is recognized by its three leaflets, which are shiny-green in the spring and summer and rusty orange in the fall. I

f you touch any part of this plant – the leaves, stem, roots, even in winter – you may break out in a serious skin rash.

It is important to take steps to protect yourself and your family. Black-legged Ticks are very small and often hard to see.

Here are some tips to stay safe:

- Remain on trails and avoid long grass and shrubs
- Check yourself and your children for ticks when returning from any natural area
- Use bug repellant with DEET and wear long sleeved tops and pants



### Leave natural objects where you find them



Collecting natural objects or even moving them to create a shelter on the beach is disturbing habitat of some of our most sensitive species. Leave driftwood where you see it, don't collect wood for your campfire or collect any rocks, feathers, shells, etc to take home.
