

When you land on the island, you will see rocks that mark the trail. This rocky habitat is called the **rocky barrens**. Dotted with low-growing plants and bushes, and exposed to harsh weather conditions, it has low resilience and is home to many sensitive plant species, including **rare arctic alpine plants**.

- Use the **designated trail** when walking on the seashore.
- Avoid disturbing wildlife and be sure to leave natural objects such as rocks, plants, and fossils where you found them.
- Be attentive and keep your distance from seabirds; they are particularly vulnerable to disturbance.


- The island was named île du Fantôme after the schooner, Phantom, which sank off the coast in 1862.
- It's easy to confuse black-legged kittiwakes with herring gulls. How do you tell the difference? Black-legged kittiwakes nest in colonies on the cliffs. The adults have pale yellow beaks, black feet and black wing tips. Adult herring gulls have yellow beaks with a red dot, pink feet, and black wingtips with white spots.
- Near the wharf, keep a look out for traces of fossilized marine organisms. They might be the fossils of mussel shells or of skeleton parts dating back 465 million years.

Checklist
