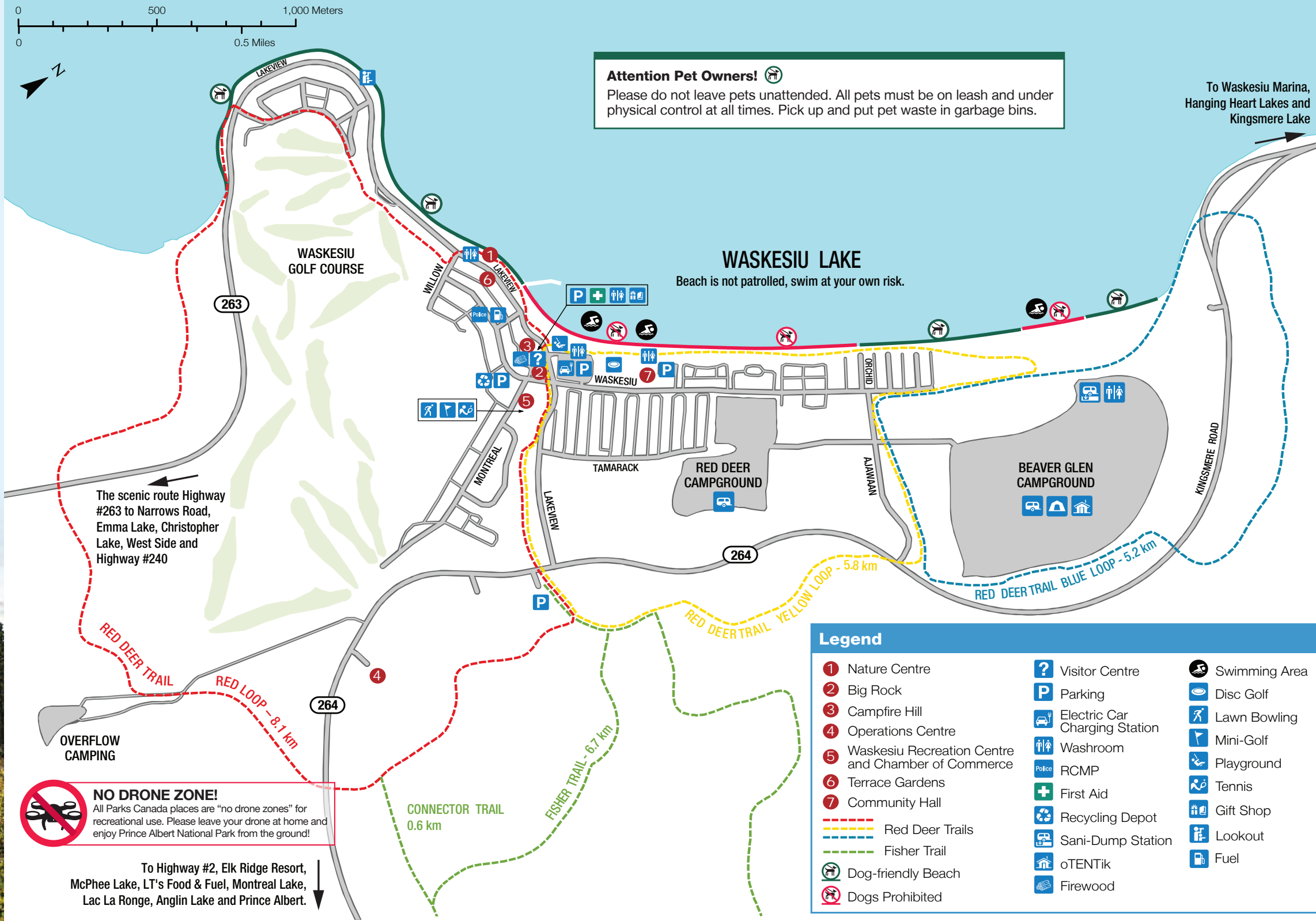

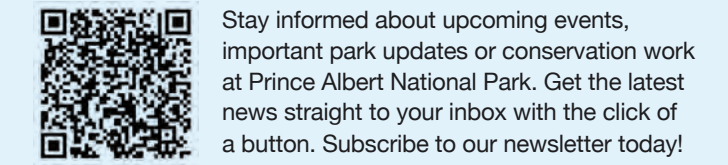

Prince Albert National Park is open for winter adventures. Explore the beauty of snow-covered forests and frozen lakes on skis or snowshoes. Park entry fees apply year-round. Contact the Visitor Centre to plan your visit today!

## National Parks Regulations

Follow all National Park regulations. More information is available online under the Canada National Parks Act and at Parks Canada visitor centres.

**Do not feed wildlife.** Leaving food, garbage and scented items unattended can result in inadvertent feeding of wildlife. Securely store all wildlife attractants when not in use.

**Preserve the park.** Leave flowers, rocks, antlers, artifacts and all other objects undisturbed.

**Obey all posted speed limits, area closures, restrictions and warning signs.**

**Check for fire bans and know the local fire risk** before starting a campfire. Fires are only permitted in designated fire pits.

**No drone zone:** Leave drones at home and enjoy Prince Albert National Park from the ground!

**For the safety of pets and wildlife,** it is illegal to let any pet off leash in Prince Albert National Park.

## Stay Safe and Protect Wildlife

**Keep a safe distance from all wildlife.** If an animal notices you and changes its behaviour by lifting its head, looking at you or listening to you, you are too close and should back away.

**Travel in groups and make noise** to let wildlife know you are nearby.

Wildlife are more aggressive at different times of the year. **In the spring,** females of all species will defend their young. **Late summer and early fall** is elk and bison mating season; be especially aware of wildlife along trails at these times.

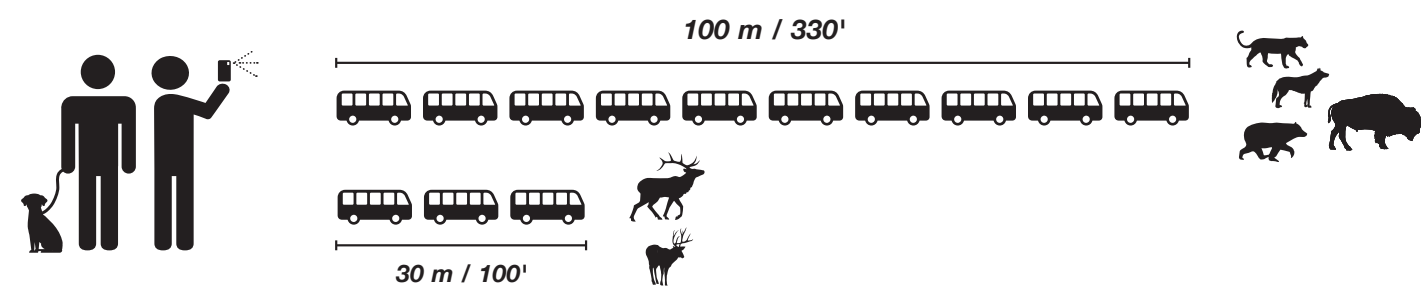
If you encounter elk, moose or bison on a trail, **let them know you're there** by singing a song or whistling a tune. **Walk slowly around them at a safe distance or return the way you came.**

**Do not feed wildlife;** they have a greater rate of survival and are healthier when they eat natural food.

**Keep your pet on a leash and under physical control at all times.** Dogs can provoke defensive behaviour in bears and other wildlife.

**Know what to do when you see a bear.** Read the *Black Bear Country* brochure for more information on bears and how to prevent an encounter, available at any park facility.

There are alcohol and cannabis restrictions in effect in frontcountry campgrounds on all long weekends.

Keep campsites clean. This means scented items or food are never left alone, even for a minute. Leaving scented items out puts visitors and wildlife at risk and can result in a fine.

### Mandatory aquatic invasive species (AIS) watercraft certification permit

All watercraft\* must have a mandatory AIS watercraft certification permit before entering Prince Albert National Park waters to help stop the spread of AIS.

\*This includes motorboats, canoes, kayaks, stand-up paddleboards, wind surfing boards, inflatable boats, rafts, and rowboats.

Pick up your free AIS watercraft certification permit at an entry gate, the Visitor Centre, marina or a self-certification station at a boat launch or day-use area.



### Backcountry Camping

Campgrounds are equipped with picnic tables, pit toilets, firewood, fire pits and caches for securing wildlife-attractants.

All overnight visitors, including for random backcountry camping, must register at the Visitor Centre before leaving for the backcountry. Sites are first come, first served.

**Fees:** Backcountry fees apply to all overnight backcountry stays.

#### Safety:

- Check the weather, trail and wildfire risk conditions before heading into the backcountry.
- Pack appropriate equipment and extra food in case you're out longer than anticipated. Be prepared to be self-sufficient for up to 72 hours.
- Before your trip, read the *Black Bear Country* brochure.
- Pack appropriate equipment, extra drinking water and food in case you're out longer than anticipated.
- Take navigation tools and a first aid kit.
- Most backcountry areas do not have cell phone coverage. Bring along a satellite communication device instead of relying on your cell phone.
- Share a trip plan with trusted friends or family.
