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THE LURE OF THE YUKON

FROM:

Whitehorse



ROUNDTRIP:

Approximately 1540 km



LOCATIONS:

Kluane National Park and Reserve Chilkoot Trail, S.S. Klondike, Dawson Historical Complex, S.S. Keno, Discovery Claim and Dredge No. 4 National Historic Sites.





Venture to the land of the midnight sun,

where rich culture and history intertwines with wide open spaces and opportunity for adventure! From rugged mountains to charming northern towns, this itinerary is one to add to your bucket list.

DAY 1

Whitehorse

Explore the grounds of the **S.S.** *Klondike*, one of two remaining sternwheelers in the Yukon and the largest of its fleet. Learn about fascinating stories of life on the river, and what it takes to restore and maintain the dry-docked vessels that shaped an entire era of transportation. From there, stroll the banks of the Yukon River, stopping along the way to visit the McBride Museum and the Kwanlin Dün Cultural Centre.

DAY 2

Carcross, 70 km from Whitehorse then take the train to Bennett

Explore majestic Carcross and check out a modern-day First Nations commercial village known as The Commons. Then board the White Pass and Yukon Route train where you can step into the Northern Wilderness of Bennett. Explore the intriguing ruins of the town which lived its glory years during the gold rush. You can camp overnight to explore the legendary Chilkoot Trail the next morning, or board the train back to Carcross the same day.







DAYS 3, 4, 5 AND 6

Kluane, Haines Junction, 155 km from Whitehorse

Home to 17 of the country's 20 tallest mountains, including Canada's highest peak, 5 959-metre Mount Logan, **Kluane** also has the world's largest concentration of ice fields and glaciers.

Stop in at the **Da Kų Culture Centre** to get up-to-date park information and explore the interpretive facility that honours the Champagne and Aishihik First Nations language, stories, connection to the land and living culture. Stretch your legs along the **Dezadeash River Trail** before heading to your reserved Parks Canada oTENTik to camp under the stars at **Mät'àtäna Män - Kathleen Lake campground**.

Get your hiking gear together and discover the amazing landscapes Kluane has to offer by foot! Consider hiking up the **King's Throne Trail**, or enjoy the scenery along **Mät'àtäna Män** (Kathleen Lake), the **Kokanee Trail** or the **Rock Glacier Trail**.

Be sure to take a drive to the northern side of the park in the Ä'äy Chù Valley, which boasts incredible scenery and fascinating exhibits at the **Thechàl Dhâl' Visitor Centre**. Out on the deck, you might even get lucky and catch a glimpse of some Dall sheep through the spotting scopes! Before you go, soak in the panorama of Kluane Lake from the **Soldier's Summit Trail** or climb up on **Sheep Creek Trail** to get incredible views of the valley.

DAYS 7, 8, 9 AND 10

Dawson City, 688 km from Haines Junction

Travel north to Dawson City, once known as the "Paris of the North" where the legacy of the Klondike Gold Rush and the cultural traditions of the Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in blend seamlessly.

Visit the waterfront and board **Tr'ehcho** (S.S. *Keno*), a small but mighty vessel representative of two cultures who are intimately connected to the Yukon River. Step inside **historical buildings** and chat with costumed guides to hear the stories of the quirky characters who once walked the wooden boardwalks of this storied town and to learn about the full scope of our shared history. Challenge yourself in one of two different **escape rooms** in some of Dawson's oldest buildings, or find yourself exploring the Dänojà Zho Cultural Centre to hear about Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in stories and traditions.

Keep some time to explore the famed Klondike goldfields! Visit **Gah dëk** (**Discovery Claim**) and follow the trail to the spot where gold was found in 1896. At **Lëzrą kảnëchà** (**Dredge No. 4**), be amazed at the story of how this sluice dredge plied the creeks for gold, forever altering the landscape. Don't forget to visit the abandoned company town site of **Bear Creek**, eerily frozen in time when the last dredge finally stopped running and the company closed its doors over 50 years ago.

Travel back to Whitehorse through Chicken, Alaska along the aptly named Top of the World Highway or extend your adventure into the Arctic with a once in a lifetime road trip on the Dempster Highway (next page)!

JOURNEY TO THE ARCTIC

Navigate through some of the most beautiful scenery on the planet! Follow the route used by Indigenous peoples for thousands of years and take in dramatic tundra landscapes, mountain ranges and spectacular wildlife.

DURATION: 7-10 DAYS



FROM: Dawson City, YT To Tuktoyaktuk, NT



ROUNDTRIP: Approximately 1300 km

TRAVEL TIPS:

- June to early September is the best time to visit.
- Prepare for varying weather conditions with appropriate clothing and gear.
- Fill your gas tank whenever you can and carry a spare tire.
- Be cautious and respectful of wildlife on and near the road.
- The Dempster Highway can be rough gravel; check on road conditions before you start your trip.
- Bring a satellite phone if you have one and let someone know where you are going and when you plan to arrive.

STOP 1

Tombstone Territorial Park, YT

Make your way to the famed Dempster Highway, where your journey starts. Commemorate this adventure with a roadside selfie and enjoy the journey to Tombstone Territorial Park (YT km 65). Once there, be sure to check out the Tombstone Interpretive Centre (YT km 71), take a walking tour. or go for a hike. Behold the scenic views of the rugged mountains.

STOP 2

Eagle Plains, YT

As you continue north, stop at various scenic pullouts along the way for breathtaking landscapes, such as the Ogilvie-Peel Viewpoint (YT km 259). Eagle Plains (YT km 369) is the perfect place to rest before continuing your journey to the Northwest Territories. As the Dempster Highway crosses the Arctic Circle (YT km 405), be sure to snap a pic and take in the incredible views of the area.

STOP 3

Inuvik, NT

The Yukon-Northwest Territories border is located at YT km 465 and NWT km 0 (kilometres reset at the territorial border). Consider exploring the Gwich'in communities of Fort McPherson (NWT km 86) or Tsiigehtchic (NWT km 143) along your route. Once in Inuvik (NWT km 272), check out some of the local sights and don't forget to stop into the Parks Canada Office to say hello and find out why Inuvik is the perfect starting point for further northern exploration!

STOP 4

Tuktoyaktuk, NT

At your final destination, visit the unique landforms at Pingo Canadian Landmark. Don't miss the impressive lbyuk, the largest pingo in Canada, the second largest in the world. While in Tuktoyaktuk, go for a paddle, visit the large coin monument, or dip your toe in the Arctic Ocean. Immerse yourself in the Indigenous culture, art and history of this Arctic coast community.

THE CHALLENGE

How can we protect a critical area to Indigenous communities where traditions have been rooted for generations? Thatdene Nëné extends from the East Arm of Great Slave Lake to the tundra, and holds important boreal forest, freshwater and tundra ecosystems, as well as migration routes for key species such as caribou.

A STEP IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION

After decades of negotiations, Thaldene Nëné Indigenous Protected Area, including Thaldene Nëné National Park Reserve, was created in 2019. It adds 26 376 km² of protected land in the Northwest Territories.

THE RESULT

Taking care of Thaidene Nëné is the shared operational responsibility of Łutsël K'é Dene First Nation, Northwest Territory Métis Nation, Parks Canada, and the Government of Northwest Territories. Deninu Kųę́ First Nation and Yellowknives Dene First Nation also play a key role in providing guidance for stewardship. Recognizing Indigenous Peoples' rights and responsibilities to steward their lands, waters and ice is fundamental to how Parks Canada is approaching the establishment of new protected areas.

SALLIKULUK

Rose Island, (Sallikuluk in Inuktitut) has been used by generations of Inuit who have lived, hunted, gathered, and used the island as a meeting place. Part of Torngat Mountains National Park, this small island located in Saglek Bay, is also a resting place for Inuit as there are over 600 traditional Inuit rock graves. When you step onto the island you know you have arrived at a truly special place.

WHAT WILL YOU FIND?

Exploring **Aulavik National Park** is like getting to peek into the lives of countless generations of people before you. There are cultural sites everywhere! Paddling along the Thomsen River is my favourite way to explore the park because you get to cover a lot of ground while still camping and hiking during the evenings. Always keep an eye out for muskoxen and Arctic wolves and more — you'll be amazed at what you can find!

A PLACE FOR SUSTENANCE

Set in a bowl of surrounding mountains, "Naaqpait Tasinga" in **Auyuittuq National Park** is a spectacular large, clear lake that's known for its char ("naaqpait" here refers to big bellies on the fish). It drains into Naaqpait (Narpaing Fiord) through a short, fast river where you can see lots of fish running in the fall. Old rock caches with thick lichen growth show how long this has been used as a harvesting place - and is still in use today by Inuit from Qikiqtarjuaq. You'll also see signs that birds, foxes, and bears come here too to find sustenance.
















WOOD BUFFALO NATIONAL PARK KLUANE NATIONAL PARK AND RESERVE

UNDER NORTHERN SKIES

Venture up north to watch the northern lights dance in the largest dark-sky preserve in the world. The best time to see the magic of the dark sky in Wood Buffalo National Park is late summer, fall and early spring.

Kluane's two-day Northern Nights festival held annually in September features a variety of fun activities, including star gazing with local astronomers, night sky photography workshops, traditional storytelling, live music and kids' activities.



MAKE IT HAPPEN!

HOW TO GET TO CANADA'S NORTH

BE PREPARED

- During summer in the High Arctic, the sun shines 24 hours a day and is very strong – bring sunscreen and a sleeping mask!
- Expect weather delays in any season; it can snow in any month!
- Get deals on airfare by contacting your travel agency and watch for periodic seat sales. For Nunavut, check with Travel Nunavut.
- Contact the park or historic site for detailed information before booking.

NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

- Tuktut Nogait, Aulavik and Ivvavik are accessible via chartered flights from Inuvik.*
 - * Fly to Inuvik via scheduled air service from Edmonton, Vancouver, Yellowknife or Whitehorse, or drive the Dempster Highway.
- For Pingo Canadian Landmark, drive up the Dempster Highway, continue past Inuvik and drive along the Inuvik-Tuktoyaktuk Highway.
- Get to Wood Buffalo via a year-round paved highway to Fort Smith, NT, or winter roads to Fort Chipewyan, AB also provide seasonal access to the park. Access both communities via flights from Yellowknife, NT or Edmonton, AB.
- Access Nahanni by chartered flights from Fort Simpson or Yellowknife, NT, Muncho Lake in BC or Watson Lake in the Yukon. Get detailed information by visiting parks.canada.ca/nahanni.
- Nááts'ihch'oh is accessible through chartered flights from Tulita or Norman Wells, NT. Get detailed information by visiting parks.canada.ca/naatsihchoh.

 Thaidene Nëné is less than 10 kilometres from Łutsël K'é, NT, which has daily scheduled flights from Yellowknife. Park access is via charter aircraft (from Yellowknife, Łutsël K'é, or Fort Smith), boat or snowmobile. More details are available at parks.canada.ca/thaidene-nene.

Q YUKON

- Kluane and S.S. Klondike can all be reached by road.
- Klondike National Historic Sites in Dawson City are accessible by car or by plane; flights depart from Whitehorse.
- Vuntut and Ivvavik can be reached by air charter from Inuvik, and Old Crow.

NUNAVUT

- **Quttinirpaaq** is accessible via scheduled flights to Resolute, then by air charter.
- Sirmilik is accessible via scheduled flights to Pond Inlet or Arctic Bay, then by licensed boat or snowmobile operator.
- Auyuittuq is accessible via scheduled flights to Qikiqtarjuaq and Pangnirtung, then by licensed boat or snowmobile operator.


- Prince of Wales Fort is accessible by boat in July and August. Cape Merry Battery is accessible by road year-round.
- York Factory is accessible by helicopter as well as by boat in July and August.
- Aerial tours of **Wapusk** are available year-round.

Free independent travelers to Churchill are strongly advised to travel with a certified bear monitor.

NEWFOUNDLAND AND LABRADOR

• Torngat Mountains is accessible by scheduled air service to Goose Bay followed by chartered flight to Saglek airstrip with a short boat trip to Base Camp. Contact Parks Canada for additional information (1-888-922-1290 or infopntorngats-torngatsnpinfo@pc.gc.ca).





24 Tallurutiup Imanga

This National Marine Conservation Area is a biodiversity-rich, 108 000 km² region that has sustained the Inuit for thousands of years. This breathtaking Arctic landscape reveals majestic fjords and glaciers where narwhals live alongside thousands of seabirds near vibrant Inuit communities.
